

## Bill Dannemeyer On Pedophilia

The courageous Congressman Bill Dannemeyer (R-CA) is once again one of the few Members of Congress willing to brave the gay lobby. Recently, he told the Congress how attitudes have changed toward those who molest children: "The North American Man/Boy Love Association (NAMBLA) calls the molestation of young boys a 'right.'" ## The Double Standard

A white got out of his car to use a phone, two blacks asked him what a honkey was doing on Tremont Avenue, shouted at him, and then shot him in the stomach.

There were "no marches, no outbursts, no handwringing, and hardly any press coverage." When a black minister who had helped stir up the Bensonhurstomania was asked about it, he said it wasn't racism, it was "revenge."
